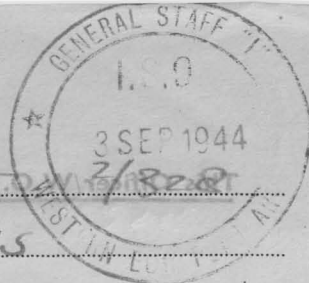

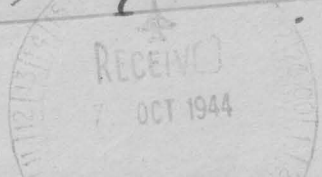

SUBJECT: Amended Instructions Concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War, to Include Evaders of Capture in Enemy or Enemy-Occupied Territory and Internees in Neutral Countries.

Director, Bureau of Public Relations.

1. Publication or communication to any unauthorized persons of experiences of escape or evasion from enemy-occupied territory, internment in a neutral country, or release from internment not only furnishes useful information to the enemy but also jeopardizes future escapes, evasions and releases.
2. Personnel will not, unless authorized by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, publish in any form whatever or communicate either directly, or indirectly, to the press, radio or an unauthorized person any account of escape or evasion of capture from enemy or enemy-occupied territory, or internment in a neutral country either before or after repatriation. They will be held strictly responsible for all statements contained in communications to friends which may subsequently be published in the press or otherwise.
3. Evaders, escapees, or internees shall not be interrogated on the circumstances of their experiences in escape, evasion or internment except by the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations. In allied or neutral countries, American Military Attaches are authorized to interrogate on escape, evasion and internment matters.
4. Should the services of escaped prisoners of war, evaders, or internees be deemed necessary for lecturing and briefing, such services will be under the direct supervision of the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations.
5. Commanding Officers will be responsible for instructing all evaders, escapees, and internees in the provisions of this directive which supercedes letter, AG 383.6 (5 Nov 42) OB-S-B-M, 7 November 1942, subject: Instructions concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War and other previous instructions on this subject.

I was the first to bail out on 26 June, 1943. My harness was loose, so I was badly jarred when the chute opened. When I landed in a tree, my left shoulder was ~~badly~~ injured. I left the chute in the tree. This was in the BOIS DES COUQUEREAUMONT, 3 miles north of BERNOUVILLE, EURE.

I walked about a mile and hid in the woods. The following day I met a Frenchman from whom I bought civilian clothes. I buried my uniform and headed toward PARIS. I contacted a shepherd who took me to the home of M. RENE MISPOLET at VESLY, EURE. M. MISPOLET was about 68 years of age. He had lived in Canada and spoke English. He lived with his mother and 2 sisters, ~~and owned several harvestors and binders which~~ and he earned his living by renting his harvestors and binders to ~~the~~ neighboring farmers. During my stay in this house, ~~with~~ his mother and one sister died. ALICE, the remaining sister, was about 70. Only one farm worker knew I was there.

We were visited by M. MISPOLET's cousin, Mr. RENE LAFAY and his wife. They lived in PARIS, but had a home in VESLY. ~~xxxxxxx contact xxxxxxxx~~

I tried to contact an underground, but was discouraged by the people who spoke of great dissension between the groups. I remained hidden there even while a Panzer division was training in the vicinity in January. Later they were organizing Czechs and Poles into companies.

(M. PUISSANT)
In July, 1944, the mayor of VESLY approached M. MISPOLET about hiding some aviators. When he was told they had been hiding one, he talked to me about getting away. ~~His name was M. PUISSANT.~~

On 10 August, I was taken to the acting mayor of HACQUEVILLE, par ETREPAGNY. This man was a schoolteacher and formerly a captain in the French Air Force. His name was MAX ROULET. (?) Here I met ¹⁴⁵⁶ an RAF P/O ADDINGTON (MICHEL) and 4 other Americans: 1/Lt Donald WREN, 1/Lt Marvin A. THOMPSON; ¹⁴⁶⁰ T/Sgt Steve TERPAK, and Sgt Angelo STAFFO. ¹⁴⁵⁸ ¹⁴⁵⁷

We 6 stayed inside the churchyard in the home of the curé. The curé had died several months previously, and there had been no replacement. The maid still cleaned up the house, and we were fed ~~very well~~ there.

M. ROULET claimed that he was head of the resistance movement in this section. The real chief was called M. ANATOLE or M. ANDRÉ. He was hiding from the Gestapo, but sent orders twice daily. The messenger was Jacqueline ROBERT, HACQUEVILLE. M. Louis LASCUER, a butcher, and M. DUVAL, a farmer, were members of the group.

On 29 August, a flying column of the 19th Highlanders came through the town. We contacted the captain. On 1 September, we hitch-hiked to ETREPAGNY. There we went to an RAF airfield, and were sent by station wagon to wing hqs. En route we had an accident, so hitch-hiked to BAYEAUX where we were briefly interrogated by the WEA. We flew back to the UK on 4 Sept.
